

he town of La Democracia feels a bit like a refuge. Located about an hour inland from Guatemala's Pacific coast, the roads leading into the small community are rugged and broken, hugging steep, curvy hills, and showcasing tranquil, beautiful vistas. Close to Zoemía Solis' house, three little girls play together behind a pickup truck that no longer starts. They jump in the back and giggle together, content and oblivious in their own world. Tiny ducklings waddle past, racing to keep up to their mother. Even the air feels fresher here somehow.

Despite the idyllic setting, however, the community faced real challenges. Easily accessible clean drinking water was a rarity. Because of the pandemic many people couldn't find work, making it hard to afford food for their families. When they did have food, it often wasn't healthy or diverse due to the general lack of understanding around nutrition. Women faced discrimination, seen only fit for roles as mothers and caretakers for their husbands and homes.

Because of your faithful support, things in La Democracia are changing. Zoemía stands next to her family's vegetable plot. Vibrant purple beets and bright green spinach peek through the fertile soil. Yorban, her 9-year-old son gazes proudly at her, his arms draped around her shoulder. Zoemía received this plot from her father in law, Enrique. Enrique heard of the opportunities Lutheran World Relief was providing through their project with FundaSistemas focusing on improving health and nutrition. He wanted Zoemía to be able to take on her own opportunities.

Although she hadn't previously grown vegetables, with the help of a mentor, Zoemía's first harvest flourished. Her family's nutrition has improved, and she no longer worries about feeding her family. She sells extra produce in the local market, adding to the household income.

With her newfound confidence and leadership skills, Zoemía is even shifting gender roles in her community. She was recently elected to vice-president of the local community council.

Your generosity is transforming lives in Guatemala. Your support has provided agricultural training and mentoring, access to clean water, and leadership opportunities for women like Zoemía.

"I feel proud of myself," Zoemía said. "I am very proud. I want to set a good example for my children, to give them my best. And I'd like to motivate others as well."





FOR PEOPLE AROUND THE WORLD, a cup of coffee (or three) is an integral part of their morning routine. And while we can't seem to live without it, not many of us stop to think about how it got there. Or how, as a Faithful Neighbor, your love helps the farmers growing it.

In Coffee and Conversation, our inaugural virtual event exclusively for monthly givers held this past April, we explored just that. Coffee, Cocoa and Latin America brought together Lutheran World Relief experts Carolyn Barker-Villena, Senior Regional Director for Latin America and Rick Peyser, Senior Relationship Manager of Coffee & Cocoa. The result was a fascinating and informative conversation about how your monthly gifts help in projects that protect this beautiful region and the families whose livelihoods depend on it.

The session began with an overview of the **MOCCA** (Maximizing Opportunities for Coffee and Cacao in the *Americas*) project. The six-country program — which reaches 20,000 farmers and their families, 40% of whom are women — helps farmers sell more at better prices, improves production processes, and trains local cacao producers. As a result, participants have

been able to support their families, educate their children and put food on the table every day.

Your generosity is critical to creating sustainable solutions for these farmers and their families. "Without your support, we wouldn't be able to do this really important work," Carolyn said.

The session ended with an update on the emergency crisis in Ukraine, where your love has brought food, emergency relief and supplies and emergency cash funds to our neighbors in Ukraine.

"Because of our Faithful Neighbors, your compassion and generosity month after month, we are able to bring your love where it's needed most, when it's needed most," Karen Holbrook, Senior Associate of Monthly Giving & Stewardship reflected. "And we're not going to stop until your love reaches every neighbor."

rowing up in rural Faulkton, South Dakota, **Kate Reuer Welton's** parents didn't have a lot of extra money. In a world pre-internet, she wasn't constantly bombarded with issues of suffering all over the world, but Kate had a clear-eyed view of who could use an extra hand in her community. Her parents showed up for families in need mostly with their time and taught their daughter what it meant to be faithful and generous.

She started to understand how her own life was enriched by being around people with different resources, and after a volunteer stint with Lutheran World Relief in the Kakuma refugee camp in Northwestern Kenya during college, she felt called to do her part in building a world where people could live with dignity and hope. In the camp, she worked closely with some of the 20,000 boys who were displaced or orphaned during the Second Sudanese Civil War, often called the Lost Boys of Sudan. The boys showed her how "God shows up in all kinds of place and in all kinds of people."

Now a campus pastor at the University of Minnesota Twin Cities, Kate and her husband Jim want to raise their children Ben, 8 and Eleanor 5, with the same sense of compassion and generosity that comes from serving others. Indeed, after living in Minneapolis, Minnesota over the last 2.5 years, she and Jim have had lots of opportunities to have complicated conversations about God's calling to compassion and service with the kids. Much like many people in their city, and around the

country, the Reuer Welton's were marked by the uprising following the murder of George Floyd. "We couldn't not talk about it," Kate said. "We had to engage pretty deeply. It served as a chance to talk about the world as God intended versus the world we stand in now, and how our call is in that gap. We can be a bridge."

Often the kids brought their piggy banks to church after hearing about someone in need. But Kate and Jim wanted them to be more intentional in their giving, not only reactive, so they suggested finding an organization that they could each donate to monthly.

Because of Ben's interest in East Africa, particular the Democratic Republic of Congo, he ended up choosing Lutheran World Relief, and became a Faithful Neighbor at the beginning of the year.

"I personally love Lutheran World Relief; they are doing great work," Kate said. "I really want the kids to feel connected to the organization they picked and the work they are doing."

Ben said when he donates to Lutheran World Relief, he feels "happy" because he knows so many people need a helping hand.

"Because of monthly giving, Ben and Eleanor now understand that they might not always get the biggest, shiniest toys and things," said Kate. "But we can all be part of something much bigger than ourselves."

# **GROW OYSTER MUSHROOMS**

In Guatemala, your support is helping female farmers like Roselvina De Leon Gonzalez to feed her family and generate income. Your generosity provided training and support to help Roselvina, 31, learn to grow oyster mushrooms, a protein-rich food that contributes to both her family's health and their financial security.

Her husband and children aren't the only ones that enjoy the healthy addition to their plates; people from the surrounding area are also seeking out her mushrooms to buy. The crop has been such a success that while she once considered migrating for better job opportunities, projects like these are changing her outlook. "The goal is to no longer have to think about migrating," she said.

With such market demand, Roselvina hopes to scale up and have 2-3 more mushroom grow rooms, or modules, in the future. You can follow along with her process below. O



- **DISINFECT** the substrate. A substrate is a material that the mycelium, or the seed of the mushroom, can use for energy and nutrition. Roselvina uses corn as her substrate, letting it soak for 24 hours, and then dry for another 24 hours.
- MAKE the substrate "cake." One layer of corn, one layer of mycelium is placed into bags with small holes or air filters in them for air exchange.

- **INCUBATE** the substrate, or let it develop. Incubations last 35 days; the magic has begun!
- **HANG** the bags. Roselvina brings the bags to the module where they spend another 20 days growing in a warm, dark environment.
- **HARVEST** the mushrooms. The mushrooms emerge from the holes in the bag and when full size, they can be cut off.
- **EAT** the mushrooms. Roselvina's family likes them best breaded, with tomatoes and onions, or in mole.

ngan Malem Pandia is a farmer in North Sumatra's Karo Regency in Indonesia, an area renowned for its high-quality Arabica coffee. Walking home every day from the farm, Ingan passed plastic bottles, bags and food packages littering the road. She shares in her own words the story of how the Kopi Nande Program, supported by The Starbucks Foundation and your generosity, has cleaned up her village and brought additional income to the women that live there.

It all started when I was walking home after working at the farm. All I could see was garbage. You name it, we have it. Plastics, bottles, food packages, agriculture packages — and they were everywhere. I consulted my friends, and everyone agreed. We have to do something about this before we are swamped with garbage and diseases. The problem was, we did not know how to do it.

We like to think of our meeting with Lutheran World Relief's Kopi Nande Program as our own serendipity. Officials from Kopi Nande were trying to convince the village leaders to implement a waste management activity in our village. Their idea of a garbage bank was something we have been looking for. We were nodding throughout the meeting and wanted to kick off the activity as soon as possible. Then we did.

Kopi Nande patiently held our hands throughout the process. From the introduction to waste materials, development of garbage bank functional structures, the establishment of the bank management system, introduction to the garbage off-taker, as well as the execution of the bank promotional activities. We established a five-women management team, and we worked tirelessly to establish the bank.

On September 19th, 2020, we successfully opened our garbage bank. On that first day, 18 customers signed up. We pay about 3 cents for a kilogram of unsorted garbage and about 10 to 14 cents for sorted garbage depending on the materials. After just ten days, the bank successfully collected 2 tons of garbage. Our first sale to the recycler made us \$120 USD. We were so happy.

A year has gone past. Today, the bank has 185 customers consisting of women, men and children. We have sold over 20 tons of garbage and made a total of \$1,500 USD. Most of our customers use the money saved at the bank for school needs, such as books and stationery. And now, there is less garbage seen on my way home after working at the farm.
