Venezuelan Refugee Crisis in Peru

SITUATION OVERVIEW

More than 2 million Venezuelans have left their country over the past two years due to an escalating economic crisis that has left the once-prosperous country struggling with alarming rates of extreme poverty, malnutrition and violence. The situation is a result of mismanagement of state funds and the collapse of a one-dimensional economy heavily dependent on oil exports. Inflation rates soared to 2,600 percent in 2017, drying up pensions and making salaries insufficient to cover basic needs, even for relatively well-paid government employees and professionals. Venezuelans are going to neighboring Colombia and Brazil, and further south to Peru, where there are now more than 450,000 Venezuelan refugees.

INTERNATIONAL HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE EFFORTS

The UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR) is expanding operations in Columbia over the next two months and is working with local organizations to set up additional reception centers for Venezuelans. In northern Peru, UNHCR reception centers that were built to receive 200 to 300 refugees a day are trying to manage 1,000 to 1,200.

Several humanitarian organizations have launched responses to the crisis. However, the response so far has been focused on border areas where Venezuelans are arriving, leaving urban areas neglected and lacking basic services to facilitate their integration into society.

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF – ACTIONS TAKEN AND NEXT STEPS

Thanks to a commitment of \$50,000 from the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), Lutheran World Relief is extending and expanding our response, now valued at \$134,000.

We are partnering with Encuentros, a Jesuit non-profit that has been working with the Venezuelan population in Peru since 2016, to establish a support network for Venezuelans arriving in Peru. We are also working with partner churches in Peru to build their capacity to respond to humanitarian crisis.

Venezuelans are arriving at reception centers that are not equipped to receive such large influxes of people, who are often in need of immediate medical care, food, water and hygiene supplies. Additionally, there is a major gap in the services available to new arrivals, including legal services to apply for work and establish residency in Peru.

In collaboration with Encuentros, we are improving the quality of services in four reception centers in Lima and Piura, developing a mobile application to help refugees access legal support and other services, and working with local media outlets to produce an awareness campaign designed to promote positive integration and support for Venezuelans in Peru.

We are also working with Caritas Peru to distribute LWR Quilts and Care Kits to Venezuelans, the majority of whom have arrived in Peru with little more than the clothes on their back.
