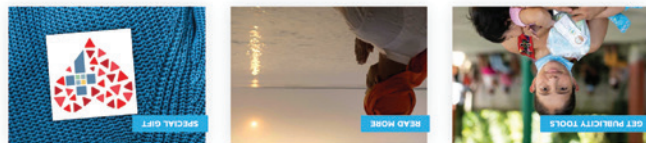

HER CHILDREN ARE HUNGRY. WILL YOUR CONGREGATION SHARE GOD'S LOVE?

SUZAN NZABAKE TOILS ON HER FARM, DAY IN AND DAY OUT, TRYING TO GROW COFFEE AND VANILLA THE BEST WAYS SHE KNOWS HOW. BUT THE FLOWERS KEEP DROPPING OFF HER PLANTS BEFORE THE FRUIT HAS A CHANCE TO DEVELOP, AND HER YIELDS ARE ALWAYS SMALL.

Suzan's family lives in extreme poverty in Kasese, Uganda. They sleep on the floor of a tiny mud hut, and they have very little to eat. Her children are sick "all the time," she says, and she has to make frequent visits to the hospital with them.

"They don't play," she laments. "The little ones just spend time crying and dozing off." At school, the older ones fall asleep in class because they're hungry and have no energy.

Suzan often eats just once a day so there's enough food for her children to eat twice. Her stomach rumbles and she feels lightheaded while she digs the soil by hand, but there's nothing else to eat to keep her going. She says when she came down with malaria recently, it took a long time to recover because she was so weak from hunger.

"Our family and I survive, but life isn't good," she says.

Still, Suzan prays fervently for a better future. "The Bible says you should ask God what you desire, and I pray that he blesses me through my land and that what is within it should uplift me."

Your congregation can be the answer to her prayers.

Lutheran World Relief visited Suzan's farm to see how we could share God's love with her family. Soil tests showed that there were very little nutrients to sustain her crops, and she had no access to fertilizer or basic farming tools.

That means no matter how hard she works, Suzan will labor in vain unless she receives training and tools to improve her yields and her income. No matter how many times her children visit the hospital, they won't thrive — and they may not survive at all — if they don't have enough to eat.

Suzan, her children and so many others have done everything they can to help themselves. But they are poor, hungry and exhausted.

As followers of Christ, will your congregation extend your hand to these precious neighbors — to feed them when they are hungry? To provide what they need so they can learn to provide for themselves?

Your congregation's love can be the answer to their prayers. ■

COVID-19 RESPONSE UPDATE

We are so grateful that many congregations have generously donated to reach neighbors who would otherwise be forgotten during the COVID-19 pandemic. Already, these gifts are at work in displacement camps, remote villages and poor communities that urgently need them.

-  In **Mali**, your love arrived in the form of food vouchers and farming supplies to help increase food security among hungry families displaced by conflict.
-  In **Nepal**, your gifts are spreading the word that COVID vaccines are safe and will help to prevent severe illness. You're also supporting health centers in vulnerable areas to obtain, store and administer the vaccines.
-  In **Kenya**, your support has delivered ICU beds, personal protective equipment and other critical supplies to help health workers treat COVID patients in the poorest slums of Nairobi.
-  In **Yemen**, your congregation reached families living in remote camps after civil war drove them from their homes. In addition to food, your kindness provided critical water and sanitation supplies to help prevent COVID-19 and other communicable diseases.

CREATED AND CALLED TO LOVE GOD AND OUR NEIGHBORS

Pastor Elizabeth has led two congregations to share their love with neighbors in India, including Madhu (10) and Annu (6) Kumari, whose parents have learned new agricultural techniques to improve their livelihoods for years to come.



Pastor Elizabeth Felt's relationship with Lutheran World Relief began during a chance encounter with an LWR staff member who stopped by her congregation. She was deep in the midst of VBS week at Trinity Lutheran in Freeland, WA. The theme that year was water. On a whim she asked, "Could there be an LWR water project that the kids could raise money

for?" Soon Pastor Elizabeth found herself talking about clean water and filtration kits with young people. Their enthusiasm grew quickly, and by the time the adults of the congregation got wind of what the children were excited about, **their generous spirit was contagious.**

Soon Pastor Elizabeth's congregation was on board with a \$100,000 multi-year commitment to share God's love with their neighbors in Bihar, India. This was certainly a stretch for the congregation, but Pastor Elizabeth suspected the congregation had potential and gifts that God had given them that they didn't know about yet. Before long, the congregation was making Indian dinners and implementing their own

fundraisers. As every pastor hopes, the congregation's passion has far outlived Pastor Elizabeth's time at the congregation.

"I saw how a partnership with LWR could open up a congregation to seeing themselves as global citizens and doing what Jesus tells us to do: love God and love your neighbor. I saw how this partnership deepened their discipleship and transformed their relationship with Jesus."

Today Pastor Elizabeth's congregation, Advent Lutheran in Maple Grove, MN, is sharing their love with their global neighbors through LWR as part of a capital campaign. **"We have to do partnerships when we can,"** she believes. **"This work wouldn't happen without non-profits. LWR knows how to do this work. This work needs to be done. And they have the local people on the ground that know how to do the work well."**

Pastor Elizabeth doesn't just lead her congregation to share their generosity but joins alongside them. "God gave and gave and gave. And that's who God created us to be. We are created in the image of God, and I am most at home and alive when I am giving."

We are so grateful for Pastor Elizabeth ... and for all of you who so passionately steward the gifts of your congregation to make a real difference in the world. ■
