The powerful impact OF A PERSONAL CARE KIT

The simple, everyday contents of a Personal Care Kit can make a world of difference to a neighbor in need.

When natural disasters strike or war drives families from their homes, our hearts ache with compassion, but often we don't know how to help. Making Lutheran World Relief Kits is a simple, fun and tangible way to offer comfort to those suffering and express love to our neighbors in need.

Kits are specifically designed to help people coping with poverty, disaster, conflict and more. In the direst of situations, these extensions of your congregation's love bring dignity and hope.



Congregations play a critical role in helping ensure we have enough kits for the constant demand we receive. Personal Care Kits, which provide much-needed self-care and critical germ-fighting tools, are one of our most requested items.

Moses Kabogo, LWR staff in Tanzania, spoke about how

Personal Care Kits are used,

and their incredible impact for our most vulnerable neighbors. He has witnessed firsthand the impact of Personal Care Kits on pregnant and new mothers.

WHO RECEIVES PERSONAL CARE KITS IN TANZANIA?

We distribute Personal Care Kits to health facilities in Tanzania, focusing on pregnant and those new mothers who have just delivered.

HOW ARE THESE KITS USED?

Most pregnant and new mothers, especially in the rural areas, do not have access to personal care items. The kits distributed through LWR in health facilities provide these mothers with items such as towels, soap and nail clippers. The items help them clean and cover themselves and their babies, protecting them from the cold. In addition to keeping themselves and their babies clean, they also love the soaps because they smell so good!

WHAT IS THE IMPACT OF A PERSONAL CARE KIT?

It is a huge challenge to get pregnant mothers to give birth at health facilities. It is often far from their homes, and they worry about the expenses of medical care. We found that distributing Personal Care Kits is a great incentive for women to come to the health facilities. This way we can make sure the mothers and newborns receive the proper care plus they have supplies to help them when they get back home. ■

A MOTHER'S HEARTACHE

DESPERATE STRUGGLES OF A TANZANIAN FAMILY

Smiles are a rare sighting on Agata Nicolaus Mtowe's face. Some days, there's not a lot to be joyful about. A mother of six in rural Tanzania, Agata spends her days caring for her children — a 6-year-old son, 4-year-old twin daughters and year-old triplets — and keeping up the house. Her exhaustion seeps into her bones, she is tired all the time. The worry weighs heavy on her small frame. When asked about her hopes for her children, she looks down to the floor with a sullen face. She can't speak to hopes and dreams, only regrets.

"I try my best to do what I can, but I can see them not growing well."

Agata lives with her husband Oscar Raymond on a small farm, their only source of income and food, although occasionally her neighbors will give her pumpkin or sunflower seeds. Oscar farms maize and beans; this year he's trying onions. If he harvests 10 sacks of maize, they might keep five and sell the remainder. Currently, they have one bucket with roughly 45 pounds of beans. It's meant to feed them until the next harvest.

Usually, they have enough food remaining to get them through, but this year is difficult.

To prepare for Agata's delivery of the triplets, they had to sell more of their produce than normal so that they could pay for the extra expense of a C-section. They ran out of the food they set aside, but neighbors have come together to supply them with some small amounts. Agata fears it is not enough.

She's already having trouble producing enough breast milk for the triplets. She often must remove one child while they are feeding to allow the others a chance to have some. The milk only seems to come if Agata's eaten enough pumpkin or sunflower seeds, but she only gets them if her neighbors give them to her. She knows her babies are not getting enough to be satisfied.

As a mother, Agata worries all the time. Her children are hungry, and she can't afford soap so the children often wear dirty clothes. Her husband is exhausted from farming, leaving for the fields at 6 a.m. and often not returning until evening, so Agata often finds herself alone in the child-rearing and housework.

The babies don't sleep — most likely from hunger and the penetrating cold. Agata says it is the nights that are the most difficult.

Her eldest child, Evans, 6, tries to be helpful. He says his dream is to “grow big to help Mommy.” He attends primary school, leaving the house at 5 a.m. for the two-hour walk each way and returning around 4 pm. Evans is very helpful with his younger siblings, often holding the triplets and playing with them while his mom cooks. He also helps by fetching water and firewood. Compared to a 6-year-old in the US, Evans is very small. But with more than 50% of the children stunted in Tanzania, he looks to be a “normal” sized first grader here.

While the needs of her family are great — school fees, food, soap, clothing, there’s always something — the one time Agata smiles, a faint, barely visible one, is when she is asked about her family.

“I enjoy being a mom. It makes me happy to see all my children together in one place, laughing and happy.”

Unfortunately, without your love, those moments will be as rare as Agata’s smile.



HOW YOUR LOVE IS HELPING OUR NEIGHBORS IN TANZANIA

While the need in Tanzania for families like Agata’s is overwhelming, because of your support, we are improving the health and nutrition of mothers and their families. Your love is training and sending community health workers into remote villages like Agata’s to teach parents how to make nutritious meals and share critical hygiene skills. And Agata’s family, along with countless other families in Tanzania, has received Personal Care Kits and LWR Mission Quilts. These are simple interventions that have truly profound impacts. The kits are a tangible act of kindness, produced by congregations around the US, that reminds our neighbors in Tanzania of God’s ever-present grace and love. ■

GOOD SHEPHERD LUTHERAN CHURCH: COME TO WORSHIP, STAY TO SERVE

After nearly three isolating years of the pandemic, Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Naperville, Illinois, longed to bring their church back together to once again capture the camaraderie and fellowship that an in-person community creates. To encourage participation, “Better Together Sundays” were created, providing fun ways to celebrate ministry, increase fellowship and serve side by side with one another. At one such event, Jeannine Allen, Director of Missions at Good Shepherd, invited her congregation “to come to worship and stay to serve.” And not only did her congregation show up in droves, but they also created an astounding **1,500 Personal Care Kits** for Lutheran World Relief in the process.

Jeannine wanted to find a tangible, yet simple way to bring her congregation together while helping others. Good Shepherd was familiar with Lutheran World Relief through their quilting ministry. Stories of the global refugee crisis had been on the hearts of members, and she knew that people wanted to help but weren’t quite sure how. Assembling Personal Care Kits seemed the perfect solution.

COMING TOGETHER IN SERVICE OF OTHERS

After rallying the congregation to donate supplies for the kits, they hosted an event after Sunday service to assemble them. More than 175 people showed up, ranging from young children to the young at heart, working for several hours at packing stations around the church. While the initial goal was 1,000 kits, they soon increased it, with an additional 75 members of the ladies group joining the following Tuesday to complete 1,500 kits.



“It was such a wonderful experience to come together in this way and such a phenomenal response,” Jeannine said. “It was crazy. We had 3,000 bars of soap, 1,500 towels, toothbrushes, clippers and combs, all filling up entire office rooms. But it was a good kind of crazy. **And now everyone is asking me one question, ‘When can we do it again?’**”



Following the momentum and energy of the Better Together Sundays, Good Shepherd found themselves hosting their first Ingathering — a local collection event for LWR quilts and kits — just a month later. The women who ran the local Ingathering at a nearby church were retiring and when Jayne Reishus, who leads Good Shepherd’s quilting team heard, she asked Jeannine if they could fill the void. All in all, some 22 churches participated, which served as one of the Ingatherings for the greater Chicagoland area.

“There’s a purpose God has in this community, in this church,” Jeannine said. “This is just one small thing, but it’s tangible and easy to do. The numbers of kits we made were great, but the real success was the shared joy of coming together in this way. And the opportunity to collectively pray for those who would receive these items.”

Thank you to Jeannine, Jayne and the entire Good Shepherd congregation. You are truly a blessing to others. ■

ONE YEAR LATER: THE WAR IN UKRAINE



It's been nearly a year since war in Ukraine has devastated a country and left millions fleeing violence. In that time, your love has enveloped thousands of our neighbors in need. This is how you've made a difference.

Essential health care services. Your love has provided critical medical supplies and equipment, mobile health clinics, training of health workers, and mental health support for Ukrainians in need.

Emergency shelter. Because of you, Ukrainians who fled their homes are supported with emergency housing and hot meals. Shelters were upgraded to prepare for the harsh winter and much-needed quilts and kits were distributed.

Empowering local partners. Your kindness helped to support Ukrainian partners, strengthening their ability to drive the emergency response.

Protecting vulnerable women and girls. In times of crisis, women and girls are often the most vulnerable. Your generosity has ensured these women and children have a safe place to turn and find support when they need it.

Cash assistance for Ukrainian refugees in Poland. You are providing a safety net for those most in need by providing emergency cash funds for families who fled to Poland. ■
