Protection of Sudanese Refugees and South Sudanese Children in South Sudan



BACKGROUND

Due to conflict and insecurity in Sudan, through support from the U.S. Government, Lutheran World Relief and Lutheran World Federation/ Department for World Service (LWR/DWS) are:

- Responding to immediate child protection needs of boys and girls;
- Ensuring children have access to quality basic education; and
- Ensuring youth and adults develop life and vocational skills.

The project targets 24,452 of the most vulnerable people, mainly children, while also indirectly benefiting 92,108 individuals.

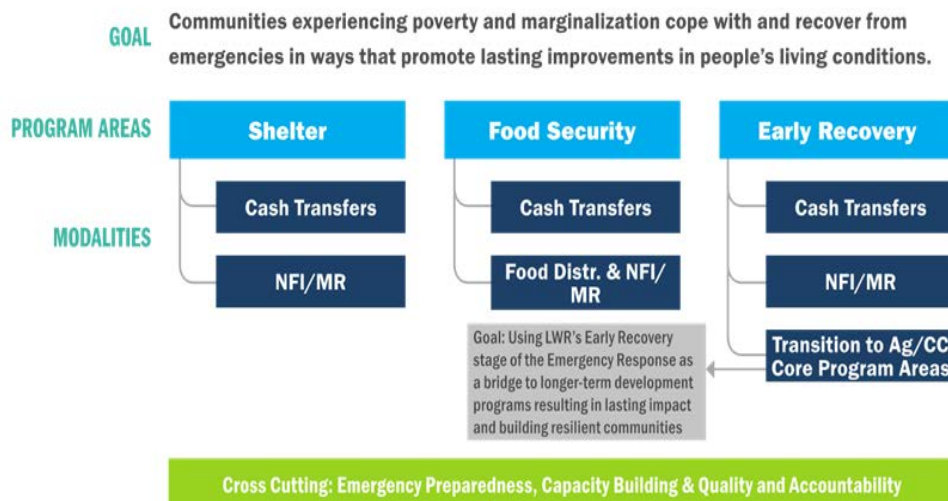
PROJECT PERIOD:

September 15, 2015 – September 14, 2016

FUNDING: \$1,500,000

ANTICIPATED RESULTS

- 12,300 refugee and host community children attend daily Child Friendly Spaces activities in Ajuong Thok, Yusuf Batil, Kaya and Gendrassa, both in the camps and the host communities located in each camp.
- 85% of unaccompanied and separated children are in appropriate and protective care arrangements.
- 150 young adults are enrolled in a vocational training program. 70% of these students earn an income by the end of the project.
- In Ajuong Thok Refugee Camp alone, children make up 51% of the population.
- The project addresses immediate protection needs and seeks to strengthen community structures that protect children in the camps, such as establishing Child Friendly Spaces and promoting child protection through community-based networks.
- The project supports the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees' (UNHCR) humanitarian response to ensure vulnerable refugees in Ajuong Thok Camp in South Sudan live in **dignified** conditions. The project's emphases are to meet **priority protection needs** and to align with **Sphere standards**.
